Once upon a time...

We all know what makes a good film and what makes a boring one.

In a good film, stuff happens. It's exciting. We can't wait to find out what happens next?

There aren't any boring bits where the story... drifts.... off... into... the...fog.

So, when we write a movie, let's make it a good one. But how?

Easy! Just follow these simple steps:

Creating a Hero

Every story needs a Hero. So, let's create one. It doesn't matter if it's a boy, a girl, a pug or a slug, just pick a creature you like.

Then give them a challenge. That's it! See, I told you it was easy.

Imagine a Dodo, like the one made by William de Morgan.



What would be *really* hard for this little bird to do?

- Fly?
- Play the piano?
- What else?

Or if you chose Prince Charming? What would it be *really* hard for him to do?

- Be a baddie?
- Have a day off?
- What else?

What about Ariadne? Shown in this this wonderful painting by Evelyn de Morgan?



Ariadne has been abandoned on a desert island? What would be *really* hard for her to do?

• Escape?
• Survive?
Win Strictly Come Dancing?
Who is your hero? Is it a dog or a cat? A shy boy or a poor girl?
What's their challenge? To be brave? To be rich? To win Dog of the Year?
That's what your story is about.
Plot
Then all you have to do is take your Hero for a walk.
Where are they going? To face their biggest challenge!
The Start
THE Start
First, we see the Hero in their ordinary day. What does that look like? Are they a bit bored?
Then something (from the challenge) calls them away. The Hero can't resist.
"But watch out!", warns a friend, "If you go on this journey, your life will change forever".
The Middle

The Hero leaves their home and enters the brave new world (of the challenge).

After a clumsy introduction, the Hero nervously approaches the Great Big Battle.

It's a serious case of "What's the worst that could happen?"

Then Oh No! The Hero fails. It's totally embarrassing.
But in that moment, they learn something. What does your Hero learn?
The End
The Hero feels cringey and is chased home. Are they chased by the baddies? Or their shame?
Unable to escape, the Hero must finally face up to their challenge, in one final battle.
But this time, they have a secret weapon, the wisdom they have learned.
They triumph. Hooray!
The film ends with the Hero back in their ordinary world, but it's no longer ordinary.
Congratulations, you've just written a movie!
